Council prohibits street parking along Highway 43

There will be no more parking along the corridor between Lerdo Highway and Central Avenue.

The City Council recently voted to prohibit on-street parking there because of the car wash being built in the area.

The developer said this resolution would have to be enacted to prevent any problems along that stretch of highway. This would prevent people from parking on the street on Highway 43, especially in front of the pharmacy located off Highway 43 and also

in front of the courthouse buildings.

The council also approved the sale of the city-owned property at 250 Carver St., to Nutrient Ag Solutions, Inc., which currently is an empty lot. Nutrient Ag Solutions will build a warehouse about 42,000 square feet. The sale price is still yet to be determined, depending on the exact acreage

of the purchase.

The city and Nutrient Ag Solutions have agreed on a price of \$145,000 per acre. The company expects their sales annually to be about \$50 million dollars. This means about \$500,000 in sales tax revenue for the city.

In other action, the council approved a

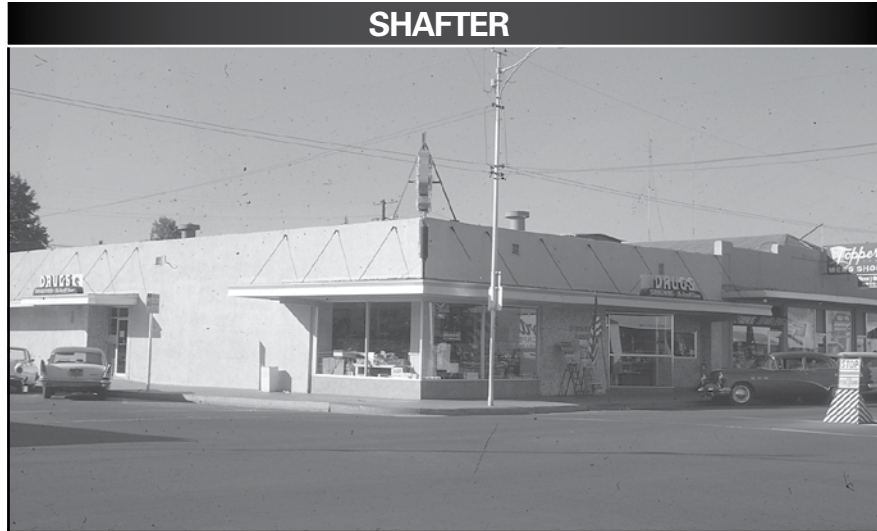

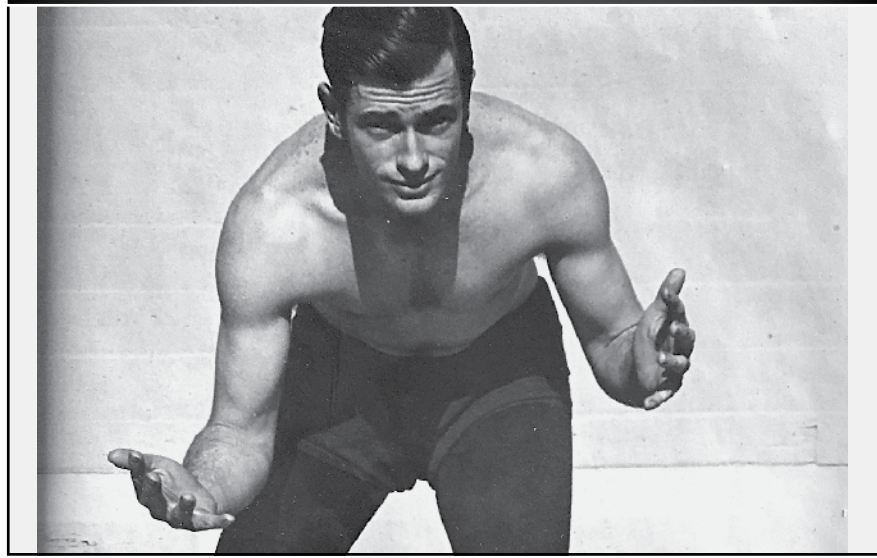

Committee reflects on Rose Festival 2021

The Rose Festival Committee had to work quickly this year with three weeks to prepare after the festival got the OK from the City Council.

"Several of us had been receiving inquiries from Wasco residents about whether or not there would be a parade and festival," committee member Sharon Sharp said. "When it looked like it would not happen, we decided to get a group together and see if it was feasible to arrange in three weeks. We believed Wasco should not go another year without those events."

Sharp added last year when the quarantine was in full force, the committee understood canceling everything, but this year it needed to happen.

"The countdown began," Sharp said. "We reached out to people who are vested in the community and set out to assess the circumstances, determine priorities and do what needed to be done. We started as a group of folks committed to an idea and grew into a committee, which solidified with each communication."

Traci Mills-Clendenen explained they began by determining what was needed and based tasks on individual strengths, she said.

"Each of us has strength and the more discussions we had, our strengths became our tasks," Mills-Clendenen said.

"Everyone had input into all areas," she added. "For instance, Camilo Vasquez had helped with parades in the past but his expertise with food vendors was essential. So his primary task was at Barker Park,

his contribution to the organization of the Rose Parade was invaluable.

"Ultimately the entire festival was a collective effort," committee member Emma Dobbs stated. "Our whole team stepped up and helped each other out."

The leaders of each area were: Logistics - Emma Dobbs, Traci Mills-Clendenen, Orquidea Ocampo and Camilo Vasquez; Parade - Juan Gallardo and Sharon Sharp; Permits - Orquidea Ocampo; Publicity - Sharon Sharp; Spokesperson - Juan Gallardo, Vendors - Emma Dobbs and Volunteers - Juan Gallardo.

Clendenen also worked with Josh Hinojosa representing Blood Alley Truck and Car Club to organize the car show that Danny Rueda had organized prior to his passing and in past years.

"I also worked on logistics at the park with Emma, Orquidea, and Camilo so the vendors and car show would feel like one event instead of separate events," Clendenen said.

"Orquidea, Ruvi, and Traci also worked on the Orange Heart Foundation Dance that closed out the day separate from their festival duties," Sharp added.

"While everyone worked hard, I cannot imagine how we could have pulled this off without Juan Gallardo," Sharp said. "He was like Mary Poppins! He just kept showing up with exactly what we needed. He is the epitome of what we strove to build - a committee of hard workers, who bring creativity and fun with no ego or care about credit to do good things for the community

they all love."

Asking committee members what was the biggest challenge of all, the consensus of opinion was the lack of time was the biggest challenge. The second biggest obstacle was knowledge.

"While each had organized events in the past," Sharp said. "None of us had planned and executed a parade, festival and car show nor had we put together something of

this magnitude with so little lead time."

The committee then addressed the easiest part of putting the event together and that was that each member of the committee supported each other.

"We all felt the same pressures and weaknesses and stood by each other," Mills-Clendenen said. "We did not let another one fall."

"It was my first year helping in this event and putting together and assisting vendors," Dobbs said. "I needed help in some areas and everyone joined together to help me. Every question I had was answered. From late night FaceTime calls to going out of their way to send me nice messages. I truly am so happy to be part of this team."

Dobbs said that leading up to the parade was very stressful, "but the day of seeing the kids smiling, the vendors being so kind to me and seeing how well the day went made me very happy."

"My favorite part of this event was seeing the outcome of it," Ocampo said. "In such a short amount of time, we were able to get it done. Residents drop off bulk waste at event

Residents hauled their bulky waste to the Shafter Aquatic Center last Saturday, ready to dispose of it.

The City of Shafter, Kern County Public Works, and American Refuse teamed up to hold the event.

Residents brought their appliances, E-waste, mattresses, and much more that would otherwise be taken to the landfills.

"This event helps residents as well as the city and county workers, making sure this waste gets disposed of properly," said Lynnda Martin, of American Refuse.

Bulky items, such as appliances and mattresses, often times end up getting dumped illegally, with those attempting to get rid of them not knowing where to take the items. An opportunity to dump these items free of charge helps eliminate illegal dumping.

Trucks were lined up waiting for the waste, as residents drove through and dumped the items into the correct bins, each one housing a different material, such as a specific bin for computers, televisions, printers, and another for mattresses, furniture, and appliances. It was estimated that there

would be over two tons of waste collected at the event, with the majority of it going to recycling stations.

By the end of this year, residents are going to see their alley way bins being replaced with individual bins for each resident, each one responsible for their own waste. This change will be explained in upcoming literature that will be sent out to residents, city officials said, letting them know what will be expected out of each resident. There will also be specific guidelines regarding organic waste, with residents being expected to separate their waste accordingly, be it green waste, paper waste, and household trash.

compensation philosophy that will mean equal pay for equal work, as well as being competitive in today's labor market. This would take into consideration the current economic market, as well as any unforeseen economic developments.

The council also discussed how to spend their monies that were awarded to the city from a federal emergency rescue block grant that were given to cities because of the pandemic. Shafter was awarded

\$4.6 million in federal money. The city must submit a report on how they will spend the money; including replacing lost revenue due to the pandemic, as well as helping local businesses.

There are restrictions on how cities can spend the money, depending on how each city was hit by the virus. One project that was discussed was the necessary repairs needed at the Shafter Aquatic Center.

One idea that was considered was the demolition of the Aquatic Center

and replaced by a splash pad, skate park, and playground. This project was not recommended by the city.

The city did discuss the possibility of using the money for repairing the Aquatic Center and keeping the pool and the area active. Council said that they are in discussions with the Shafter Recreation Department in reaching an agreement on getting the Aquatic Center viable and active. These discussions will continue on the effort of keeping the pool open and operable.

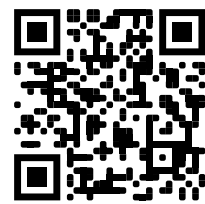

Kern County participating in covid-19 study

Area residents will be among those surveyed about vaccine protection and antibodies.

Kern County Public Health Services is collaborating with several different organizations where people were randomly selected to complete an anonymous survey as well as receive a free, at-home covid-19 antibody test.

Those selected for the survey and free antibody test began receiving their packets

Oct. 15. This information will allow Kern County Public Health to learn how many who have been immunized are protected against the virus and have built up antibodies.

The department is working with the California Department of Public Health, Stanford University School of Medicine, Enable Biosciences, Exa Health and other public entities in different counties, which include

Alameda, El Dorado, Kern, Los Angeles, Monterey, San Diego and Shasta.

The study will not ask for identifying information, such as name or date of birth. Mailed invitations were sent to 200,000 households in select counties. For more information about CalScope, visit the study website at CalScope.org.

Even though the county has offered free vaccination clinics, the numbers continue rising for the newly infected.

On Oct. 14, Wasco had a total of 6,210

total infected people since the pandemic began March 2020 and saw an increase of 112 newly infected persons on Tuesday, Oct. 19.

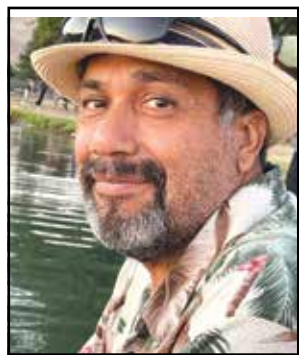
