City's festival of fun

The second part of this year's Wasco Festival kicked off Saturday morning in downtown Wasco, with floats, marching bands, motor vehicles of all sorts and sizes, horses, and even a mule.

The parade on Saturday included groups from several local groups such as the el-

ementary school district bands, high school band, churches, equestrian groups, floats and a lot of walkers.

Onlookers lined the parade route from D Street to 7th to Poplar, finishing at Barker Park, where the festival was already underway.

Grand Marshals Ken and Tina Newman rode through the parade in a buggy drawn

by a mule The crowd got a big laugh watching the mule. "The donkey was funny," young Jose Garcia said.

2019 Rose Queen Elisa Flores and her court rode on a shiny float.

Also riding close to the beginning of the parade were Grand Marshals Danny and Petra Rueda in the Rueda's vehicle.

The Glennville rodeo queens on their horses were highlighted by one with roses around its neck, while another had a small drape of colorful flowers.

In the middle of the parade, several members of the City Council rode in Engine #1, greeting and waving to the crowded sidewalks.

Report: Decline in absenteeism at WUESD

The Wasco Union Elementary School District received good news with the 2017-2018 Attention 2 Attendance report.

The district ranked first out of four local school districts who also utilize the Attention 2 Attendance software program to track chronic absenteeism.

At the board's meeting on Oct. 8, Assistant Superintendent Brad Maberry stated that the district has made attendance a high priority in order to minimize student ab-

ences

"This is not a state-mandated report," Maberry said. "Several school districts subscribe to this program to track their absenteeism. At this time, I'm not sure all the districts which use the system."

District Title I teachers Jennifer Fendrick and Teri Acosta presented the A2A report to the board and attendees.

After the board meeting, Maberry provided additional information on attendance tracking for Kern County and the state by



Tiger spirit was on the rise as Wasco High prepared for 2019's Homecoming festivities.

The annual street rally this year was held on Palm Avenue at the entrance to the football field. The street was crowded with students and onlookers as cheerleaders performed several routines, and competition was stiff as each class vied for the title of best float of 2019 as well as best in the competitions between the classes.

The overall theme this year was Tiger Productions. Each class picked a movie theme for its float. The freshman class chose

"Grease," sophomores chose "Ghostbusters," juniors chose "The Lion King" and seniors chose "Toy Story." For the float results, the freshman took first place,

took third and sophomores took fourth. With shouts and cheers, the homecoming king and queen candidates were in-

troduced.

Dataquest. The following are the results of the latest tracking data for the following districts, Kern County and the state:

- Arvin Union has a cumulative enrollment of 3,291 with a chronic absenteeism of 274 with a score of 8.5%.
- Bakersfield City has a cumulative enrollment of 33,278 students; 4,966 chronically absent students for a rate of 14.9%
- General Shafter Elementary with a cumulative

enrollment of 156 students: 19 chronically absent students for a rate of 12.3%

- WUESD has a 3.877 cumulative enrollment with 288 students chronically absent for a 7.1%.
- Wasco High School (the only high school listed on the study) has 1,965 cumulative students, a total of 271 chronically absent for a rate of 15.0%.
- Cumulative enrollment for Kern County is 199,474 students with 24,042 chronically absent for a 12.2%
 - Cumulative statewide

enrollment is 6,384,619 for a chronic absenteeism count

of 702,531 for an 11.1%.

Maberry stated that the district should see a drop in chronically absent from 7.1% to 6.1% for the 2019-2020 year.

Superintendent Kelly Richers explained that the Title I teachers (Fendrick and Acosta) monitor the A2A attendance report and provide updated information to the principals on a monthly basis. They also provide the student and families with assistance in getting outside agency help for food, school supplies, housing and clothing, and whatever other assistance

the families might need. The great report stated that the WUESD received a 24.49% improvement above Tehachapi's 21.6% improvement, Norris Elementary 21.0% improvement and Greenfield Union Elementary 18.49% improvement.

The report also gave the following numbers:

■ Some statistics reported included 83% of students chronically absent in kindergarten and first grade cannot read on level by the time they are in third grade.

Students not reading by third grade are four times more likely to eventually drop out of school and high school dropouts are more likely to be incarcerated than people with high school diplomas. Many students who obtain a General Education Diploma are in school but do not graduate for various reasons such as poor grades, incomplete classes or poor attendance.

"Another part of the A2A study showed the comparison between attendance before and after parent-teacher conferences with a decline in absenteeism after parents met with

the teacher," Maberry said. In additional board business, Superintendent Richers told the board members that while the district has been seeking a speech and language pathologist for the district and that position is very difficult to fill, consequently, Richers stated that the district would be using a computer system, which costs approximately the same as hiring an instructor. The program will cost \$100,000.



The Wasco Festival came to a rocking end with a music blowout at the Babe Ruth Park on Saturday night. The festival included a parade and plenty of vendors at Barker Park, with food, games, merchandise and information booths set up for the entire family to

enjoy. There also was also

a big car show at the park,

with over 300 vehicles on display. Rounding out the week-

end was the 3rd Annual Wasco Music Festival, with local acts performing a variety of genres, meeting every taste.

Opening the event was local band Madewell's Fireball Express. This fourman band plays authentic outlaw country with a deep southern rock vibe.

Members Marc Madewell, Mark Hokit, Mark Powell and Kelly Davis say that their influences are the artists that they grew up with, such as Johnny Cash, Waylon Jennings, Willie Nelson and even some Creedence Clearwater, and Bakersfield's own Merle Haggard. The attendees enjoyed

the band and said that it really took them back to a simpler time when they were growing up. "I remember being back in school, going out on a Friday night, sitting at a bonfire, with a bunch of friends, listening to Waylon, Hank Jr., and Willie. This band really brought those memories back and sounded great," said festivalgoer Mike Caldwell.

The event also had some great food, offering a good variety including barbecue to tacos. "The food was awesome. I had a great barbecue dinner and a few cold ones. Was a fantastic time!", said Peter Martinez.



The fun kept coming as one of the top bands in Kern County took the stage. Mento Buru has been voted the best local band by Bakersfield Life Magazine two years running, with a number of other accolades. The seven-piece band plays a mixture of Latin alternative music, combined with Jamaican SKA, rock, funk, Latin jazz and reggae creating a maddening musical experience. What started out as just a bunch of friends jamming for backyard parties in 1992, has evolved into a cross-cultural phenomenon all over California. Born during the ska craze and grunge era of the early 90s, Mento Buru was all about having fun playing the music they love with some of the best musicians in the area. Many of their former members have gone onto great careers on the world stage including: Keyboardist Dennis Hamm (Thundercat), Marcos Reyes (WAR), Rudy Parris (The Voice) and Mike Ransom (Adema).

A photo booth was available giving attendees a memento to take home, along with the memories of a night out on the makeshift dance floor. A packed house spent the night dancing to the music, including some popular line dances.

The event was sponsored by the Orange Heart Foundation, which has been at the helm of many events in Wasco the past few years. Created in preparation for the Wasco High School 100th year celebration a few years ago, a few ladies who wanted to do something for the community, started the organization and it has grown into one of the most productive groups in the area.


